Rigorously enforced academic standards and proactive student engagement reinforce responsibility, integrity, and motivation. Public History courses and the minor requirement provide applied, career-relevant learning, helping students connect theory to practice. Overall, the program offers a robust foundation that prepares students to thrive in dynamic, tech-enabled, and interdisciplinary work environments.
